The countdown is on. We have lots of things to look forward to here at St Anne's. The Kapahaka performance is now only a week away, the Mission Fair planning is underway and we are upgrading to fibre so we will have fast internet hopefully for the start of Term 4.

The last three schools I have worked in have had anywhere from no technology, to two or three computers in a room. Two of the schools had computer labs, where you could book a class in once or twice a week. St Anne's has two pods of laptops, tablets, i-pads and pcs. Unfortunately the speed of the internet is causing problems using these effectively. Teachers are 'hanging out' for fibre to be connected as so much is done on computers.

Last weekend I was at Eastgate library and I noticed a girl on Mathletics, she was working through it with a smile on her face as she improved. In previous classes I have taught, students would race to the computers before school to get extra time working on Mathematics or other projects. Developing a learner who knows what they need to work on next and how to do it themselves is a challenge, but is our ultimate aim as 'teachers.' I continually ask students, what are you learning? Why is it important? What's the next step? Although the answers weren't ideal immediately, they soon thought about their learning in more depth and by the end of the year knew exactly where they were going, why they were going that way and how they would get there. Keep the talk up at home!

Over the past week I have had five symbols on my windows as a challenge for students to find out what they mean.

"ichthys" the Greek word for "fish" If you use the first letter of each it makes "lesous Christos Theou Yios Soter" or in English "Jesus Christ, Son of God Saviour." The fish is a symbol of Christians for years and started early after Christ. For some it was a secret symbol if being a Christian wasn't popular where they were.

Pentagram—represents lots of important things in the bible that are 5. 5 Wounds of Christ, the first 5 books of the Old Testament and the star above Bethlehem.

Quatrefoil—symolises the four evangelists-Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Graded Cross (Calvary Cross) - the 3 steps represent faith, hope and love.

Keys—These are a symbol of the authority of the papacy and the Church to 'bind and loose'.

The Passion of St John the Baptist: He was the last prophet of the Old Testament, the forerunner of Jesus and was killed by a corrupted King who gave in to lust and pride.
