

Next week swimming lessons begin and will continue each day for two weeks. Parents are welcome to meet us at the pool to watch the lessons and are reminded that students must have their **named swim suit and towel in a plastic bag as well as a sweatshirt each day.**

Students and teachers will travel by bus for the following lesson times:

The parent contribution for lessons is \$30 per child and can be paid at the school office.

The true cost of lessons is over \$60 per child for two weeks, however, with the generous support of the St Anne's Parents & Friends Assn, and applying for funding assistance from the Christchurch City Council, we have been able to offer this valuable activity again at a much reduced cost.

Learning conferences: Over the next two nights students from Rooms 3, 4 & 5 along with their parents/caregivers and teachers will engage in Personalised Learning Plan (PLP) interviews in a 'student led learning conference.' In the past, parent interviews were a time when parents heard the good and the not so good things, and would come home and either treat their child or 'ground' them (I'm just going off my memory of my parents' responses to my sister's and my parent interviews respectively). Very little was gained from the experience but deep fear of them (for me). The move then went to 'parent/teacher interviews with children attending.' This ended up being similar to the above except students bear witness to the actual event. Next came 'three way goal setting,' this took the emphasis off a 'tell all' report and moved to what progress had been made and what needed to be the focus or 'goals.' Great, we are getting somewhere!!!! All three people helping the one to achieve. PROBLEM: This is still a 'teacher dominated' model! Why now the move to 'student led'? Student led conferences are similar to the last model except the student now has more control and leads the conversation. In the classroom, teachers set up and guide learning for a range of abilities and students have the ability to judge when things are too easy, or too hard, too long or too short etc. The old answer to this would've been the teacher making things harder, easier, shorter, longer and so on. Research shows the best learning occurs when students have involvement and can control and see the purpose of it. We are slowly giving them skills to accelerate their learning by making better ing decisions. The new answer is that they will make their learning more challenging and easier through choices of levels and the use of different resources etc. Leading their own conference will show you how much they understand about where they are, where they are going and what they are proud of. Research also shows students will learn more in a positive frame of mind. How can you help then? You may feel like a bystander at the interview, and if you do, then they are really doing well. Your job is to reinforce all the good learning they tell and show you. SPECIFIC PRAISE!!! Not 'you're doing well' but 'I am really impressed with the way you described the in your writing.' If you have a guestion about their learning, ask your child first, in front of the teacher. Show your child, who is really in control of their learning. The teacher will support them if needed. They may say some strange things, say little etc, but it is their first time and with each interview they will improve. I have witnessed student led conferences, and although initially strange, they have amazing effects on the children.
