Rāapa, te 13 o Mahuru 2017 (Wednesday 13 September)

Welcome to Māori language week. It is funny that for only a week people make an effort for one of our official languages, but that is better than nothing I suppose. However, there is little doubt that te reo Māori is becoming more and more used. Everything in education to do with the Ministry of Education is now written in both languages and speeches are made at conferences in both languages and they are now not being translated. It is becoming an expectation. According to all other parties (Not National) we are not doing enough. With National we are doing more than ever (probably help to the Māori party). The future is bilingual. If I was a gambling man I would put my money on it.

North Island schools are often bilingual. The South Island is a little behind but as a school we like to look to

the future. People say, learn Chinese, there are more Chinese speakers than any other. Some say learn this and that and the reasons etc. Often future predicting. Either way, although our country is very multicultural, it was built on bicultural foundations and the treaty is an official document. Our future is bilingual.

We at this school acknowledge all cultures but also adhere to the Treaty of Waitangi. Whilst many of our children can speak two languages, many cannot. We are looking at increasing the level of te reo without it affecting any other area. If anything, data suggests, multilingual students often learn more easily than single language students.

When I was at teachers college the other day, it was said that new teachers are expected to have a high level of te reo knowledge, not just the odd word, otherwise they won't be considered for jobs. The same is happening in many sectors. We aim to have our students leading the way and not missing out on future careers.

As Catholics, our tradition is so important. I can't imagine us 'losing it.' We understand the treasure of memories, traditions and language. Māori are often seen to treasure the past and their traditions while europeans are often worrying about the future and fear the idea of tīkanga (respectful ways to do things based on traditions and beliefs). What beauty in treasuring our past and making the future what we want! This week enjoy a culture full of tradition and don't fear it.
